Annual Pierce Retreat Continues to Inspire

The life's work of Fr. Michael G. Pierce, SJ, who died in 1998, has continued even years after his death. Active in the Shadowbrook Drive in the 1950s to erect a new novitiate and juniorate building in Lenox, Massachusetts, Fr. Pierce organized a weekend retreat as a "thank you" for the men who participated in the fundraising effort.

In fact, during the first few years, the benefactors' retreat was held at the seminary itself with the young Jesuit scholastics serving as hosts and dining room waiters for the men.

Every year since then, for almost 50 years, a group has gathered each September to continue the tradition and it has come to be known as the **Fr. Michael G. Pierce, SJ Retreat**. Some participants have died and new ones have joined the group. On September 26–28, 2008, close to 40 men convened at Campion Center for this year's retreat, directed by Fr. Charles H. Allen, SJ, assistant to the president at Fairfield University.

At the request of these outstanding men, Fr. Thomas Regan, SJ, the provincial, gave the opening talk on Friday evening, September 26. He shared with them—in words and photos—his extraordinary experience as a delegate to last spring's General Congregation 35 in Rome.

The catalyst for this extraordinary group is Bill Collins, a 1950 graduate of College of the Holy Cross, and chairman of the Collins Electric Co. in Chicopee, Massachusetts. Bill has been involved in the Pierce Retreat from the beginning, and it is his generous and unflagging efforts that make the retreat so successful each year.

Bill Collins personally contacts his friends, relatives and business colleagues—and even his primary care physician!—and invites them to join this annual weekend retreat. Working with the staff of the province's Advancement Office, he provides new ideas, encouragement and generous financial support to make Fr Pierce's work and memory a continuing reality year after year.

Growing the Province Annual Fund

Thanks to the untiring efforts of our dedicated committee, this year's Annual Fund continues to grow, and with the close of the fiscal year on June 30, it will provide unprecedented support for the Jesuits and our works.

The Annual Fund is designed to include unrestricted gifts, which the provincial can use in the areas of greatest need. Some of it might be used to supplement a local community's budget; a portion could be allocated for Eastern Point Retreat House to subsidize its program of retreats and spiritual direction. Perhaps the elderly and infirm at Campion Center have some special needs this year, or one of the hospital or prison chaplains has a particular expense.

In these challenging economic times, the New England Province is indeed blessed with dedicated and generous benefactors! For the current fiscal year of 2008–2009, we have 700 donors, an increase of 300 donors over last year. The dollar total is equally impressive: We have received \$170,000, which is an increase of over \$50,000 from last year at the same time.

One reason for our success could be the work of this year's Annual Fund Committee, chaired by John McNeice. Each of the committee members made a number of phone calls on behalf of the Jesuits. After making his calls, Ed Casey commented, "There is a huge amount of love, admiration and respect out there for the Jesuits."

Between now and the end of the fiscal year on June 30, we will be in touch by mail once again, asking you to consider a gift to help the Jesuits and their works through this year's Annual Fund.

As Pope Benedict XVI told us: "The Church needs you . . . to reach

the geographical and spiritual places where others . . . find it difficult to reach." It is only with your help that we can do that, and we are very grateful for your support, both material and spiritual.


Discerning Your Gift of Gratitude
