Bro. Italo A. Parnoff, SJ, entered the Society in 1935. He spent many years in Baghdad, acting as general factorum and manager of electrical and mechanical matters. He spent 10 years as assistant to the minister at Campion Center, where he currently resides.

Rev. Martin F. McCarthy, SJ, (R.I.P.), entered the Society in 1940. He was Assistant Director of the Vatican Observatory and was part of the Vatican astronomical research group in Arizona. Later he was an astronomy teacher at Georgetown University and Staff Astronomer at Kino House in Tucson, Arizona. Fr. McCarthy entered into eternal rest on February 5, 2010.



Rev. James W. Skehan, SJ, entered in 1940. After receiving a doctorate in geology at Harvard University he joined the faculty at Boston College, initially as a teacher and subsequently as Department Chair, Dean, and Director of the Weston Observatory, a career that lasted 50 years. He currently holds the title of Professor Emeritus of geology and Director Emeritus of Weston Observatory at Campion Center.

Rev. William A. Barry, SJ, a native of Worcester, entered the Society in 1950. He earned a doctorate in Psychology from the University of Michigan, taught psychology at the Weston School of Theology, and cofounded the Center for Religious Development. He served the Province as Vice Provincial for Formation and Provincial. He now serves as Co-Director of the Tertianship Program, Retreat Director at Campion Center, and is the Editor of *Human Development* magazine.



Rev. John E. Brooks, SJ, a Boston native, has been a Holy Cross Crusader from the beginning. He entered the Society in 1950 and shortly after began his work in higher education at the College of the Holy Cross, initially as a teacher of mathematics and physics, and later as theology professor and department chair. He was President of the college for 24 years making him part of the college's life for 40 years and counting.



Rev. Lawrence E. Corcoran, SJ, a native of Massachusetts, entered the Society in 1950. He taught English and was department chair for 20 years at Boston College High School. Fr. Corcoran has also worked in retreat ministry at both St. Joseph's Center in Charlestown and Campion Center where he now resides.




Rev. Robert J. Daly, SJ, entered the Society in 1950. Theology has always been a focus of his life, during his studies in Italy and Germany, and in his years teaching at Boston College. He was the Director of the Jesuit Institute at Boston College and editor of the journal, *Theological Studies*. 




Fifty Years in the Society




Fifty Years in the Priesthood


